
2016 Fair T-SHIRTS

The 2016 edition of the Rice County 4-H Fair will be available for the Community Leaders to pickup soon. There will be some changes throughout the book in various project areas to stay in compliance with the KSF. Please check with your community Leader to pick up your family's copy with entry forms.

Copyright Rules



4-H exhibitors (individuals or groups) should avoid using copyrighted materials whenever possible by originating his/her own

work. A 4-H member or group should use with caution a copyrighted and/or trademarked product or service (a brand name, label or product). The intent of using the copyright or trademark materials for educational purposes such as an exhibit, educational poster/display or public presentation is acceptable under the "Fair Use" (legal use) provision.

"Fair Use" is a provision of the current copyright law that allows reproduction without payment or permission of limited portions of a copyrighted work for **educational** and other public interest purposes.

Regardless of the "Fair Use" provision, the inference that a specific name brand product is good or bad inherently or through comparison must be done cautiously, using acceptable research/comparison methods and have a disclaimer that the conclusions are those of the 4-H participant and not those of K-State Research and Extension.

A copyright and trademark are legal methods used by writer, artist, corporation and others to protect their original work. Protected items may range from books to music, logos, cartoons, to computer graphics.

Copyrighted and/or trademarked materials utilized in banners, displays, demonstrations, posters or other activities for endorsement or promotion instead of educational purposes will be disqualified and will not be displayed or receive ribbons or premium.

The use and inclusion of specific brand names for educational purposes does not imply endorsement or refusal by the Department of Extension 4-H Youth Programs, Kansas State University Agriculture Experiment Station and Cooperative Extension Service, or the State of Kansas.

When working on the club's banners, booths or displays, call Lori to see if your theme or drawing includes a copyrighted figure. Many banners at last year's state fair were illegal, so that is why caution is high this year.

Colored Canning Jars at the Fair

The Ball Canning jars are now available in blue, purple and green colors. While these are fun for people to use, please do NOT use them for fair entries this year. The problem with using these for the fair is that the judge can't visually judge food preservation without opening the jars. This is for food safety reasons and in the event the jar is the only jar the person has, it cannot go past the county level if it is opened.

Please use CLEAR jars for the fair. Save those pretty jars for home use. There are blue, purple and green lids/rings available to match those blue, purple and green jars. It is okay to use those at the fair with the clear jars if you desire.

ALSO...Please note that if you are selling an animal(s) at this year's sale, you must have a COOL (Country of Origin Label) document on file at the Extension Office no latter than JULY 1st!!! This is NOT a Rice County requirement, BUT a STATE LAW that went into effect several years ago. So every animal (beef, swine, sheep and goats) must have a COOL document in our file. Please help us abide by this rule from the state and have them returned with your entry forms. Thanks. (PS...it can also be found on our website too)

CHARACTER COUNTS! KIDS <u>LIKE</u> TO WIN: ADULTS <u>NEED</u> TO WIN

(The following article makes very important points about competition using applications from youth sports. With summer and fall, 4-H will engage in many competitive settings. As you read, think about Mr. Joseph's comments in light of 4-H.)

Whether you're a sport fan or not, you have to acknowledge the powerful cultural influence that sports have on our culture. The values of millions of participant and spectators are shaped by the values conveyed in sports, including our views of what is permissible and proper in the competitive pursuit of personal goals.

Professional sports and even highly competitive intercollegiate sports seem irreversibly addicted to the idea that sports is basically a business and that the only thing that make sports profitable is winning. And if that means we have to tolerate egocentric self-indulgent showboating or whining, violence or even cheating, so be it. Clearly these attitudes have invaded youth sports as well. Everywhere we see that a lot of adults - both coaches and parents - need to grow up and realize the game is not about either their egos or ambitions.

The appropriate mission of youth sports is to provide kids a safe environment in which they have FUN, build character, learn to practice sportsmanship, and develop skills and traits that help them become responsible citizens and live happy, healthy lives. Striving to win is an important aspect of competition and teaching kids how to compete effectively and honorably is important, but youth sports is not primarily about winning; it's about trying to win and learning through effort and improvement.

Of course winning is fun and kids like to win, but it's the adults who distort the experience because of their need to win. No matter how much we try, only a few youngsters will move beyond high school sports, and an even tinier percentage will make a living from athletics. But when youth sports are done right, every participant can build positive life skills and gain lifelong memories from the pursuit of victory with honor. Character counts.

Record Books: A work in Progress??

Have you been working on your 4-H Record Books? Its *never* too early to start your record keeping work. The project record pages can be found on our county website at www.rice.ksu.edu. Click on the 4-H page, select 4-H Records on the left hand side and click. Project records are form fillable on the computer and are more 'user friendly'. Record books will also need a personal page, the permanent record along with your project records with photos and project stories. Juniors 7-10 years of age and Intermediates 11-13 years of age will use the same form. Seniors will use the 14 years and older form. Only 1 notebook or green 4-H record book will be used this year. Kansas 4-H SpaceTech and **Cosmosphere Overnight Experiences**

The Kansas 4-H SpaceTech Program and the Cosmosphere will again be teaming up to provide fun, hands-on and science-based programming for Kansas 4-H Youth Development. We are pleased to announce two Cosmosphere overnights in the coming year designed to be an adult-child experience, where 4-H members and adults can interact and learn from these fun and educational experiences. The program will include an overnight experience at the Cosmosphere (bring your own sleeping bag, pillow, towel and toiletry items). The experience is open to 4-H members, parents, grandparents, volunteer 4-H leaders.

#1 - Space Exploration and the Mars Habitat, Friday, September 30, 6 p.m. start. Cost (to be finalized) will include three meals, and two breaks, and an overnight stay. The program will end on Saturday, October 1, 4 p.m. Topics to be covered include: a tour of the facility, "Journey to Space" movie, creating a Martian habitat, geocaching items that you will need to live on Mars, robotics design challenge with building an item you will need to survive on Mars, a star observation experience outside (weather permitting), plus much more.

#2 – Unmanned Aerial Vehicles, Friday, March 31, 6 p.m. start, ending on Saturday, April 1, by 4 p.m. The world of UAVs has opened up the past few months. "Drones" are everywhere now. They are cheap, fun, and can do so much. Find out what you need to know to be safe and compliant with new Federal Aviation Administration regulations, plus much more. Full details about this overnight in 2017 will be shared in the next few months.

2017 Kansas 4-H and FFA Wheat Variety Plot **Enrollment Open**

As wheat harvest approaches it is time to invite new members to enroll for the 2017 Kansas 4-H and FFA Wheat Variety Plot program. The program begins fall of 2016 and goes through September 2017. The enrollment form and program details are currently available. Visit: http://www.kansas4-h.org/eventsactivities/conferences-events/wheat/wheat-varietyplots/index.html.

Members are asked to contact the Extension Office by July 10 for information with enrollments due to the Northwest Area Extension Office by July 25, 2016. Cost for 2016-17 will again be \$30.00 to receive the five varieties of wheat. This fee is now needed to contribute to the cost of the wheat varieties. It is very important that we know the number of participants early, so we can have enough seed and metal signs available for Lori to pick up at the Kansas State Fair. New participants will receive a free large plot sign, and five free individual variety signs. These will be distributed on Friday, September 9th at the 2016 Kansas State Fair.

Don't forget to pull your wheat samples for the Kansas State 4-H Wheat Show on Thursday, August 3rd at Wichita, and also for wheat samples at the 4-H fair, that may be eligible for the Kansas State Fair 4-H Crops Division.
